Paris Olympics 2024: India's Medal Winners and Near Misses

New Delhi. India wrapped up its Paris 2024 Olympics campaign with six medals—one less than the previous Tokyo Games—with no golds. The medal tally included a silver from Neeraj Chopra and five bronzes from Manu Bhaker, Sarabjot Singh, Swapnil Kusale, Aman Sehrawat, and the Indian hockey team, placing India 71st in the standings.

While the medal haul offered some moments of celebration, there were also notable near misses from athletes like Lakshya Sen in badminton, Saikhom Mirabhai Chanu in weightlifting, and Vinesh Phogat, who was disqualified from the wrestling final.

Key Performances were Neeraj Chopra, Despite being the favorite, Chopra won silver in javelin with a season-best throw of 89.45m, losing to Pakistan's Arshad Nadeem, who set a new Olympic record.

Manu Bhaker made history as the first Indian woman shooter to win two medals in a single Olympics. She won bronze in the women's 10m air pistol event and another bronze in the mixed 10m air pistol event with Sarabjot Singh.

The Men's Hockey Team secured its second consecutive Olympic bronze, defeating Spain 2-1. This win marked the end of an illustrious career for goalkeeper P.R. Sreejesh.

Sarabjot Singh, along with Manu Bhaker, won bronze in the 10m air pistol mixed team event. He has previously won three World Cup golds and two Asian Games medals.

Swapnil Kusale, competing in his first Olympics, Kusale claimed bronze in the 50m rifle 3 positions event, marking



a notable achievement in a demanding shooting discipline. Aman Sehrawat became India's youngest Olympic medallist, winning bronze in the 57kg freestyle wrestling. The U-23 world champion expressed his goal of winning gold at future Olympics.

Unfortunately, India as also faced Near calls, narrowly missing out on medals

- Arjun Babuta finishing fourth in the Men's 10m Air Rifle Shooting.
- Dhiraj Bommadevara and Ankita Bhakat missed

a medal in Mixed Team Archery.

- Manu Bhaker narrowly missing another shooting medal in the Women's 25m Pistol event.
- Lakshya Sen fell short in badminton, finishing just outside the podium.

- Anantjeet Singh Naruka and Maheshwari Chauhan lost the skeet mixed team bronze medal match by one point.

- Saikhom Mirabai Chanu missed the weightlifting 49kg medal by just 1kg.

- Vinesh Phogat was disqualified from the wrestling final due to a weight discrepancy.

These performances, both victorious and narrowly missed, showcase India's potential and set the stage for future Olympic aspirations.

20 Coaches of Sabarmati Express Train Derail In UP, No Casualties

According to North Central Railway, Sabarmati Express 19168, which operates between Varanasi Junction and Ahmedabad, derailed after striking a boulder. At least 20 coaches of the Sabarmati Express passenger train derailed in Uttar Pradesh in the early hours of Saturday. The incident occurred near Kanpur railway station as the train was en route to Jhansi. Fortunately, no casualties were reported,

but the rail route has been disrupted. According to North Central Railway, Sabarmati Express 19168, which operates between Varanasi Junction and Ahmedabad, derailed after striking a boulder. The police reported that no passengers were injured. Fire trucks and ambulances were dispatched to the scene, and a



thorough inspection of the train confirmed that no one was hurt. The railways are arranging for a bus to transport passengers to another station, from where they will be sent onward by a special train," said a police officer.

Waqf Board Amendment

A Waqf board is a legal entity responsible for managing Waqf properties, with nominated members overseeing the appointment of custodians to ensure the proceeds are used as intended. The Central Waqf Council (CWC), established in 1964, supervises and advises state-level Waqf Boards across India . and also provides guidance to the central and state governments, and Waqf boards on property management. Under Section 9(4) of the Waqf

given below :

- Mandatory registration of Waqf properties with the District Collector's Office for evaluation.
- Government properties identified as Waqf properties before or after the Act's commencement will not be considered Waqf properties. The District Collector will decide whether a property is Waqf or government land, with their decision being final. The collector will update revenue records and report



Act 1954, it can order boards to provide information on their performance, including financial records and reports.

Waqf Board Amendment Bill 2024- Waqf property refers to assets, either movable or immovable, dedicated for charitable purposes in the name of God through a deed or similar instrument.

The Union Government's made some changes to the Waqf Boards Act of 1995 have ignited a political debate. Opposition parties claim that the amendments are designed to strip the Muslim community of their land, assets, and the "freedom to manage religious affairs" guaranteed under Article 26 of the Indian Constitution. In response, the ruling NDA argues that the need for regulating Waqf boards comes from within the Muslim community itself.

The changes that people are against under this bill, these are

to the state government. Waqf properties will not be recognized as such until the collector's report is submitted.

- Disputes with Waqf board decisions can now be appealed to high courts.
- The bill removes provisions allowing a property to be considered Waqf based on oral declarations. Properties without a valid waqf nama will be treated as suspect or disputed and will remain inactive until the District Collector makes a final decision.
- The Central government will have the authority to order audits of Waqf properties by auditors appointed by the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India or designated officers.
- The amendments also seek to ensure women's representation on the Central Waqf Council and state boards.

Old Rajender Nagar's Water Logging Crisis: An Appeal for Quick Action

New Delhi. Recently, major waterlogging difficulties have been plaguing Old Rajender Nagar, a bustling locality in Delhi. These issues have brought daily life to a standstill and highlighted systemic challenges in urban infrastructure management. Normally a welcome break from the intense summer heat, the monsoon season has transformed into a miserable time for the locals, underscoring the pressing need for efficient drainage systems and sustainable urban development. Old Rajender Nagar's waterlogging problem

problem, according to residents. Roads are regularly flooded, seriously disrupting traffic flow and risking pedestrian safety. In addition to making regular trips more difficult, this ongoing waterlogging raises worries about the possibility of waterborne illnesses.

It indicates that inadequate drainage systems along with poor maintenance are the main cause of this waterlogging. The area's decades-old drainage system doesn't seem to be able to handle the amount of runoff that occurs during heavy monsoon rainfall. Furthermore, the obstruction of rainfall flow caused by the buildup of debris and encroachments on natural

Additionally, the standing water provides habitats for mosquitoes, increasing the danger of diseases like dengue and malaria that are spread via vectors. Another serious issue is damage to the infrastructure. Frequent exposure to water can erode road surfaces, resulting in potholes and higher maintenance expenses. Water damage is a possibility for both private homes and buildings, which can result in expensive repairs and decreased property values. the Former Prime Minister of Bangladesh Ms Sheikh Hassina. The Oath Taking ceremony took Place on 8th August at 8pm in the evening. The current sitting President of Bangladesh i.e. President Mohammad Shahabuddin administered the oath to the office of the new government. Nearly 400 people sitting arrangements were made in Dhaka city in order to witness this ceremony. Dr Yunis was usually residing in Paris City for his medical treatment. Coming upon the

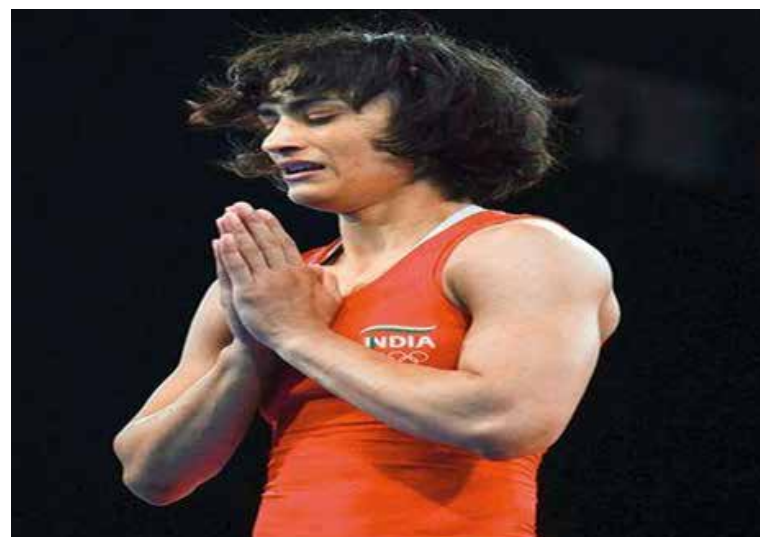
size of the interim government Muhammad Yunis has made a remark that it usually consists of around 15 members however one or two members may be added in the future. Meanwhile the outgoing Prime Minister of Bangladesh Ms Sheikh Hassina son has made a huge remark on the outgoing scenario and blamed the Pakistan ISI for being responsible for the political unrest in Bangladesh. Coming upon the effect of this political unrest which happened in Bangladesh, The Indian exports of two-wheeler trucks, buses to Bangladesh got harmed this month. Bajaj Autos – India's Largest Exporter of two and three Wheelers ships around 3.6 percent of their monthly exports to Bangladesh. Bangladesh is also an important export destination for bus and truck makers such as Tata Motors, Ashok Leyland and Eicher Motors. Industry Experts and advisers have made a remark that Bangladesh has been closed for the past three days due to the deteriorating scenario in the country. In Conclusion the overall share of Bangladesh in India auto exports is continuously shrinking after the pandemic and the current political scenario is also contributing well to this shrinkage.

Vinesh Phogat's Journey of Courage and Resilience at Paris Olympics 2024

Vinesh Phogat, one of India's top wrestlers from India who entered the Paris 2024 Olympics with determination and hope. Her journey began with impressive victories while she defeated Ukraine's Oksana Livach in a tough quarterfinal match. Then she secured a significant win against Japan's Yui Susaki, who was the reigning world champion in

the semifinals. This victory set her up for the gold medal match, a moment that could have been the pinnacle of her career. But her dreams were shattered on the day of the final. Vinesh was disqualified from the competition on August 9, 2024 after a weigh-in showed she was over the 50kg limit by 100 grams. This disqualification meant she could not compete in the final and was ranked last in the competition. The ruling was a harsh blow, especially



Highest number of countries engaged in conflict since World War II

97 countries deteriorated in peacefulness, more than any year since the inception of the Global Peace Index in 2008. Conflicts in Gaza and Ukraine were the primary drivers of the global fall in peacefulness, as battle deaths reached 162,000 in 2023. 92 countries are currently involved in conflicts beyond their borders, more than at any time since the inception of the GPI. First of its kind military scoring system suggests that US military capabilities are up to three times higher than China. The global economic impact of violence increased to \$19.1 trillion in 2023, representing 13.5% of global GDP. Exposure to conflict poses a significant supply chain risk for governments and businesses. Militarization recorded its largest yearly deterioration since the inception of the GPI, with 108 countries

becoming more militarised. 110 million people are either refugees or internally displaced due to violent conflict, with 16 countries now hosting more than half a million refugees. There are currently 56 conflicts, the most since World War II. They have become more international with 92 countries involved in conflicts outside their borders, the most since the GPI's inception. The rising number of minor conflicts increases the likelihood of more major conflicts in the future. For example, in 2019, Ethiopia, Ukraine, and Gaza were all identified as minor conflicts. Last year recorded 162,000 conflict related deaths. This was the second highest toll in the past 30 years, with the conflicts in Ukraine and Gaza accounting for nearly three-quarters of deaths. Ukraine represented more than half, recording 83,000 conflict deaths,

with estimates of at least 33,000 for Palestine up to April 2024. In the first four months of 2024, conflict related deaths globally amounted to 47,000. If the same rate continues for the rest of this year, it would be the highest



number of conflict deaths since the Rwandan genocide in 1994. The global economic impact of violence in 2023 was \$19.1 trillion or \$2,380 per person. This is an increase of \$158 billion, driven largely by a 20% increase in GDP losses from conflict. Expenditure on peacebuilding and peacekeeping totalled \$49.6 billion, representing less than 0.6% of total military spending.
